

Mentor2.0 is a collaborative partnership between Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central New Mexico, iMentor and two Albuquerque high schools - South Valley Academy and Amy Biehl High School. The program provides a mentor for each student to develop the life skills needed to graduate college and gear up for a successful career. During the 2017-2018 school year, mentor2.0 served 565 menteementor pairs. 

Relationships that Make a Difference

Building strong relationships between mentors and students is the foundation of the mentor2.0 program. Strong personal relationships position mentors to serve as early warning systems and help students navigate unexpected challenges.

College Aspirations

During high school, mentors help nuture a college aspiration that is idiosyncratic to each student's aspirations for the future. Mentor2.0 students recognize college as a pathway toward achieving their highest career and life potential.

94% of students want to go to college/technical training

Mentor3.0: Post-Secondary Success

Mentor3.0 combines the individual support of a mentor, the expertise of Big Brothers Big Sisters staff, high guality resources and events to create a foundation of support for each young person on their chosen path whether that be college, vocational training, military enlistment, or entering the job market.

In its inaugural year, 32 matches chose to join in the program. Twentynine of the students enrolled in college while three entered into the job market. The college students who completed the first year of college had an average GPA of 3.4.
